Rapid Response Team

The ELRC Region 7 in partership with STEP, Inc. is implementing the Rapid Response Team (RRT) approach through a multi-tiered system of supports, with the shared goal of preventing suspensions and expulsions. ELRC Region 7 Quality Coaches will continue to assist early care and ecucation (ECE) providers in developing and implementing suspension and expulsion policies. Providers will be encouraged to adopt these plans and include referrals to the RRT as needed. This approach will enable a timely, short-term response to referrals from ECE providers and help establish structured care plans as alternatives to suspension or expulsion. The objective is to ensure that referrals are made before incidents escalate to immediate suspension or expulsion.

This process will involve collaboration among ECE providers, classroom teachers, families, children, and community resources. The multi-tiered approach provides unified guidance throughout the process, preventing families from struggling to navigate services independently. It also equips providers with strategies that benefit not only the identified child but the entire classroom.

Code Blue

STEP Service Navigation, in partnership with First Church Williamsport, is providing a Family Navigator on-site at the Code Blue shelter Mondays and Wednesdays from January through March to assist individuals and families in need by connecting them to STEP services and other community resources.

The Code Blue shelter is open from 9pm to 7:30am daily, and is designed to provide a warm place to sleep and a meal for those in need. Code Blue is funded through Lycoming County Homeless Assistance Program, for more information visit: https://firstchurch.cc/ outreach/.

Leadership Lycoming Education Day

Mitten Tree Project

Warm, colorful mittens were distributed this winter to children enrolled in STFP Head Start. thanks to the generosity of many. This marks the 20th anniversary of STEP Head Start's Mitten Tree Project, which has been keeping hundreds of children's hands warm each winter. The collection ran from mid-October through November, then donations were sorted and distributed to Head Start and Early Head Start children in Lycoming and Clinton counties.

A total of 594 items were collected, including 316 pairs of mittens! 150 sets of mittens came from Knitters for Neighbors out of Messiah Lutheran Church, In addition, 361 Head Start children received items from the National Giving Alliance and Early Head Start was the recipient of a \$500 donation of coats from the Muncy Inmate Organization, which is comprised of prison employees.







MLK Day is the only federal holiday designated as a National Day of Service to encourage all Americans to volunteer to improve their communities. 




To kick off Dream Week, STEP AmeriCorps members joined James V. Brown Library staff for their annual MLK Day Children's event on Monday, January 20, featuring a reading of Be A King and a variety of crafts including "I have a dream" vision boards, crowns, and musical instruments.

The STEP AmeriCorps annual Peace Walk planned for the MLK holiday was revised to an indoor speaking event at Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church due to the extreme cold temperature and icy conditions outside. Speakers included STEP AmeriCorps Program Manager Carrie Bruning, Williamsport Mayor Derek Slaughter, AmeriCorps Alumna and Favors Forward Foundation Executive Director Lalitha Durlin, Bethel AME worship leader Patrick Jackson, and STEP President & CEO Rachelle Abbott, all in honor of Dr. King's legacy.







On Friday, January 24 Pennsylvania College of Technology held a "Lunch and Learn" on the topic of financial literacy. The luncheon, facilitated by Cornerstone Independent Asset Management, was held at STEP's Williamsport campus on Boyd Street.

On Saturday, January 25, the United Churches of Lycoming County organized a bus trip to the African American Museum of History & Culture in Washington, D.C.

In addition to these events, Dream Week 2025 offered many service opportunities throughout the community, including preparing meals, serving meals, packing food boxes, produce distribution, a clothing drive, and STEP AmeriCorps hygiene drive.

Satta's Seniors

For the past 19 years, STEP Office of Aging has partnered with Backyard Broadcasting, the Pennsylvania State Police, and many other area businesses to coordinate the Santa's Seniors Program. This annual program provides gift boxes to senior citizens who receive Meals on Wheels through STEP's Office of Aging. Often, these gifts are the only holiday items received by our home-bound seniors.

This year, more than 100 Meals on Wheels recipients in Lycoming and Clinton counties received Santa's Seniors gift deliveries over the holiday season!

STEP Office of Aging volunteers, Centers for Healthy Aging Coordinators, and participants of Leadership Clinton County sorted donations from the community and packed the gift sets during the weeks leading up to the holiday season. Large tote bags were delivered December 19 and 20 by Meals on Wheels volunteers and Pennsylvania State Police. Hats, gloves, scarves, toiletries, word puzzles, snacks, breakfast foods, and single-serve pantry staples were among the items included in the bags gifted to our most vulnerable seniors, often forgotten during the holidays.















2024 Community Assessments

The Lycoming-Clinton Counties Commission for Community Action (STEP), Inc. is required to complete a Community Assessment every three years. The last full Community Assessment was completed in 2024. The Community Assessment combines objective and subjective data sets for Lycoming and Clinton Counties including demographic data, community, customer, and partner surveys, partner surveys, and focus group data. The information presented in the community assessment is the comprehensive analysis of the information gathered.

Overall, six key need categories were identified: Children and Youth, Education and Employment, Families in Crisis, Housing and Homelessness, Health and Nutrition, and Seniors and Persons with Disabilities. For the 2024 Community Assessment, lack of affordable housing, lack of affordable child care options, and need for additional mental health supports were recurrent themes across key need categories.
